I transmit herewith Part 2 of Volume III of the Reports on Agriculture, Fifteenth Decennial Census. Volume III classifies statistics on agriculture by type of farm. This report consists of three parts, presenting detailed statistics, respectively, for (1) The Northern States, (2) The Southern States, and (3) The Western States. Each part contains a summary for the United States in addition to the separate reports, with statistics by counties, for the States in the area to which it especially relates.

The census of agriculture was taken in conformity with the Act providing for the fifteenth decennial census, approved June 18, 1929. The results of the census of agriculture, 1930, are contained in four volumes: Volume I, Farm acreage and farm values, by townships or other minor civil divisions; Volume II (Parts 1, 2, and 3), Reports by States, with statistics for counties, and a summary for the United States; Volume III, Type of farm (Parts 1, 2, and 3), Reports by States, with statistics for counties, and a summary for the United States; Volume IV, General report, statistics by subjects; and the reports on horticulture, irrigation, and drainage, each in one volume.

The collection and compilation of these statistics and the preparation of this volume were under the supervision of William Lane Austin, chief statistician for agriculture, assisted by Morris J. Hole, assistant chief statistician, and Dr. F. Elliott, agricultural economist.
