INSTRUCTIONS TO ENUMERATORS

GENERAL SCHEDULE FOR FARMS AND RANCHES

IMPORTANT.—Take care to canvass, with this schedule, all classes of property covered by the definition of "farm" (par. 156).

155. Scope of the Census of Agriculture.—In the course of your canvass of population all agricultural operations must be reported, including the keeping of fur animals and other livestock in captivity. Two schedules are used:

The first, the General Schedule for Farms and Ranches, is employed for all operations coming within the scope of the definition "farm." (See par. 156.) This definition, of course, covers town and village dairies, poultry operations, greenhouses, and other specialized agricultural activities. (See par. 157.)

The second schedule, Livestock not on Farms or Ranches, must be used for all other properties (i. e., properties which fall below the limits set by the definition of "farm") on which livestock of any kind is kept. (See pars. 176-179.)

156. Definition of "farm."—A farm, for census purposes, is all the land which is directly farmed by one person, either by his own labor alone or with the assistance of members of his household or of hired employees. The land operated by a partnership is likewise considered a farm. A farm may consist of a single tract of land or of a number of separate tracts, and these several tracts may be held under different tenures, as when one tract is owned by the farmer and another tract is rented by him. When a landowner has one or more tenants, renters, croppers, or managers, the land operated by each is treated as a farm. Do not report as a farm any tract of land of less than 3 acres, unless its products during the census year (see par. 160) were valued at \$250 or more.

157. The chief classes of property covered by the term "farm" as here used are as follows:

Farm Fur farm Orchard
Livestock range Poultry farm Nursery
Dairy Truck farm Greenhouse

158. Dairy farms.—A Farm and Ranch schedule should be filled out for any place where cows are kept, if the value of farm and dairy products produced and/or young animals raised during the census year (see par. 160) amounted to \$250 or more. Care should be taken to use the Farm and Ranch schedule for reporting dairies in towns and villages.

159. Domestic animals, including poultry, kept elsewhere than on farms are to be reported on Form A-100a. (See pars. 176-179.)

other products (sections VII, VIII, IX, and X) and expenditures (section VI) are to be reported for the period of 12 months ended September 30, 1939, unless you are obliged to defer your canvass of any farm until after the close of 1939, in which case the figures in question should relate to the calendar year 1939. For the sake of brevity, the term "census year" is used in these Instructions to designate the period of 12 months ended September 30, 1939, or the calendar year 1939, as the case may be. All questions other than those regarding production, sales, and expenditures relate to the date October 1, 1939.

161. General instructions.—Take care to supply all the identification data called for at the beginning of the schedule. In the space for "Number of this farm in order of visitation" enter "1" for the first report you make, "2" for the second, and so on throughout your district. Enter the same number in the last column of the Population schedule on the line on which you have written the name of the head of the household.

162. Take up the questions in the order in which they appear on the schedule. Be sure to obtain either exact or carefully estimated figures for every question that applies to the property you are canvassing. Obtain this information from the operator himself, if possible; otherwise, consult some other person who can give reliable answers to your questions. Take care to write legibly, making figures that cannot be misunderstood and can be read at a glance.

163. If the owner is reluctant to report the value of his property, or the amount of mortgage debt, or any other item of information called for by the schedule, assure him that all information pertaining to this property is treated as strictly confidential and will not be made available to any person not a sworn employee of the Bureau of the Census.

164. Section I.—Operator.—The operator of an owned or rented farm is the person who supervises or performs the work, either alone or with the aid of his household or of hired help. If the work on the farm is done under the supervision of a hired manager, he is the operator. The operator will usually be the person reported as the head of the household on the Population schedule. The principal occupation of the operator (question 2) should be stated in each case, whether he is engaged chiefly in farming or in some other activity. It is highly important that you do not fail to give, in the proper spaces, the population-sheet number and the line number on which you have entered the operator's name.

165. Section II.—Tenure.—The operator may own the property, or may rent it, or may operate it as a hired manager, or the property may consist in part of land owned by the operator and in part of land rented from others. If, however, a hired manager of one farm operates another farm (either owned or rented by him) on his own account, separate reports must be made for the two farms. (See par. 156.) Public land pastured or grazed without rental should not be reported, but all leased or rented public lands should be reported as rented. If the operator owns or rents no land but uses public land without paying rental, write at the end of section II "No land owned or rented." A homestead should be reported as owned, even though the operator may not have proved up.

166. Section III.—Acreage.—Note that the acreage reported for question 10 should be the total acreage of the farm, whether owned, rented, or managed for others. In reporting fractions of acres (questions 11 to 14), accept the operator's estimates if the exact sizes are not known. As explained in paragraph 156, a farm may consist of two or more tracts of land, not necessarily adjoining. Timberland or other nonagricultural land owned or held by a farmer as a separate property, distinct from his farm, should not be reported. Do not report the acreage of public land used without the payment of rent. A fee paid on a per-head basis is not rent, and therefore public land used on payment of such a fee should not be reported. Be sure that the figures given for questions 11 to 14 account for the total given for question 10.

167. Section IV.—Values.—This section calls for the total value of the property (whether owned, rented, or managed for others), including buildings and improvements but not including implements and machinery or livestock. The value should be the amount for which the property would sell under normal conditions, not at forced sale—not necessarily the value at which it is assessed for taxation purposes. It may be necessary in some cases to accept estimates from renters and managers. If in doubt, take into consideration values reported by other operators in the vicinity. The value given for implements and machinery

should be the estimated actual value in their present condition, not the original cost. Farm machinery owned cooperatively by a group of farmers should be reported on the schedule for the farm where it is usually kept; or if it is not regularly kept on the same farm, it should be reported on the schedule for the farm on which it happened to be on October 1, 1939. A tenant should report the value of farm implements and machinery used and kept on the farm operated by him, even though he does not own them.

168. Section V.—Mortgage debt.—This section applies to debt secured by real-estate mortgage on property owned by the operator, not to debt on property rented from others or managed for others. If the amount of such debt exceeds the total value of the property as reported for question 15, be sure to state the reason on the margin of the schedule.

169. Section VI.—Expenditures.—This section covers the specified expenditures within the census year (see par. 160), whether paid or still owed. Note that question 20 covers feed for work dogs and fur animals as well as feed for other livestock (including poultry).

170. Section VII.—Crops harvested.—Where production and sales figures are required, they should relate to the census year. (See par. 160.) Two or more grains grown together, on the same ground, should be reported as "Mixed grains," and no attempt should be made to report them separately. Be sure to name, under questions 28 and 35, any important crops not listed on the schedule.

171. Section VIII.—Nurseries, greenhouses, hothouses, and products sold.—This section applies to nurseries, greenhouses, and hothouses located on property on which nursery stock, vegetables, flowers, and other products (including livestock products, if any) having a total value of \$250 or more were produced within the census year. Livestock, including poultry, kept on such property should be reported also.

172. Section IX.—Livestock and livestock products.—
This section is to be filled out in all cases in which livestock of any kind, except fur animals, is kept on any of the classes of agricultural property covered by the definition of "farm" (par. 156). For example: If a family has a cow and/or chickens, and perhaps a garden, and their combined production during the census year (par. 160), whether consumed by the family or sold, was valued at \$250 or more, answer such of the inquiries in sections I to IX, inclusive, as are applicable to the property. If a horse or other work animal or animals are also kept, report them, together with the productive livestock, in section IX. But if the combined value of products (including those consumed by

the family) from the poultry and from other agricultural sources, if any, is less than \$250, make no report on the Farm and Ranch schedule, but report the domestic animals on Form A-101a. (See pars. 176 to 179.)

173. Bear in mind that question 56, "Milk cows," refers to cows kept primarily for milk—in other words, cows that were milked at some time within the census year and are intended to be milked in the future, even though some of them may not have been producing milk on October 1, 1939.

174. Section X.—Fur animals in captivity; animals and pelts sold.—This section relates to fur animals kept either in pens or on open runs or ranges, such as islands, but does NOT cover wild animals—those that run free and are not owned by anyone—nor pelts obtained by hunting or trapping such wild animals.

175. Supplemental information.—After obtaining answers to all the questions on the schedule that apply to the property you are canvassing, refer to the section headed "Supplemental Information," following inquiry 76. You are not expected to make entries here for every property canvassed, but you should enter any information as to unusual conditions that will help toward a proper understanding of the answers given in the schedule.

LIVESTOCK NOT ON FARMS OR BANCHES

176. Livestock not on property reported on Farm and Ranch schedule.—The schedule for Livestock Not on Farms or Ranches (Form A-101a) is to be used for reporting all classes of livestock kept elsewhere than on farms. (For definition of "farm," see par. 156.)

177. Do not, in any case, use this schedule for reporting livestock whose products during the census year were valued at \$250 or more, and do not report the same animals on both schedules, but take care to report on Form A-101a all livestock in your district that is not reported on the Farm and Ranch schedule.

178. If in doubt as to which schedule should be used, refer to paragraphs 155 to 157, inclusive, and read carefully the Explanations and Instructions on the back of the Farm and Ranch schedule.

179. Bear in mind that only those reindeer that are used or intended for use as work animals (i. e., animals trained for driving) are to be reported on the schedule for Livestock Not on Farms or Ranches. Do not report dogs not used or intended for use as work animals.

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EXPLANATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Definition of "farm."—A farm, for census purposes, is all the land which is directly farmed by one person, either by his own labor alone or with the assistance of members of his household or of hired employees. The land operated by a partnership is likewise considered a farm. A farm may consist of a single tract of land or of a number of separate tracts, and these several tracts may be held under different tenures, as when one tract is owned by the farmer and another tract is rented by him. When a landowner has one or more tenants, renters, croppers, or managers, the land operated by each is treated as a farm. Do not report as a farm any tract of land of less than 3 acres, unless its products during the census year were valued at \$250 or more.
- 2. The census year.—For farms canvassed before the close of 1939, the census year is the period from October 1, 1938, to September 30, 1939; for farms canvassed in 1940, it is the calendar year 1939. (See par. 160, Instructions to Enumerators.)
- 3. Schedules to be used.—In order to obtain a complete inventory of agriculture, two schedules are used: (1) This schedule, General Schedule for Farms and Ranches, and (2) the schedule for Livestock Not on Farms or Ranches. After completing your enumeration of each family on the Population schedule, inquire whether any member of the family operates a farm or maintains a stable, a poultry farm, or other enclosure containing livestock, and if so, and if the farm or enclosure is in your enumeration district, fill out the proper schedule. Do not, in any case, use both schedules for the same property.
- 4. The General Schedule for Farms and Ranches will be used for enumerating all farms, ranches, and special agricultural operations conforming to the definition of "farm." Special care should be taken to record, on this schedule, all operations which fall within the scope of that definition or which approach it closely enough so that there is any doubt.

tions which fall within the scope of that definition or which approach it closely enough so that there is any doubt.

This applies to market gardens, truck and fruit gardens, nurseries, greenhouses, poultry establishments, town or village dairies, fur farms, and all other special agricultural operations if 3 acres or more of land is used or if the products in the census year were valued at \$250 or more. Livestock of any kind kept on properties that fall outside the scope of the census definition of "farm" must be reported on the schedule for Livestock Not on Farms or Ranches.

5. Ranchers using public lands.—Public land used by a rancher without rental is not a part of the rancher's farm. If he grasses animals entirely on public land without paying, write at the end of section II, "No land owned or rented."

Homestead land.—Land on which the farmer has settled under the homestead law, but has not proved up, should be reported as owned land.

- 6. General method of filling out schedules.—Take care to write legibly, and in particular to make figures so that they can be read at a glance. Be sure that you know the proper entry and where it should be made before making it, so as to avoid erasures.
- 7. Source of information.—Obtain information with regard to a farm from the farm operator in every case where this is possible. If it is necessary to accept the statements of a member of his family, or of some other person, be sure that this person is able to give you reliable information.
- this person is able to give you remade information.

 3. Enumerator's record.—Fill out carefully the blank spaces in the heading of the schedule. Enter the number of the judicial division and write in full the name of the recording district in which the farm is located. Abbreviations will not be permitted. The number of the enumeration district must appear in its proper place, and the farms must be numbered as you visit them, beginning with No. 1 and continuing in order through the enumeration district. The date on which the farm was enumerated and your signature complete the entries in the heading of the schedule. All figures must be legible and reasonably large.
- 9. All questions to be answered in order.—Give the information asked for on the schedule in the order of the inquiries. Inability to obtain exact data does not justify failure to answer a question. The most accurate returns that the circumstances permit must be obtained. If farm records or accounts are kept, take the figures from these. If such records are not available, careful estimates should in all cases be obtained or made. Where there are no crops or animals corresponding to the names listed in the schedule, leave the spaces opposite such names blank. Take care to give correctly, in section I, the name of the farm operator and the place where he resides, in detail, as given in the Population schedule. Make no entries in spaces marked thus: "x x x."

ANY LIVESTOCK KEPT ON PROPERTY NOT COVERED BY THE CENSUS DEFINITION OF "FARM" MUST BE REPORTED ON THE SCHEDULE FOR LIVESTOCK NOT ON FARMS OR RANCHES

EXPLANATIONS AND GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

Not Connected with Taxation.—The information reported on this schedule will not be used as a basis of taxation, nor communicated to any assessor. It will, under all circumstances, be treated as strictly confidential.

Answers.—A definite answer must be made to every question on this schedule that applies to the farming industry as conducted on the farm of which it is a report.

Estimates.—In the absence of book accounts of the quantities and values of the farm products of 1909, careful estimates for each must be given.

What Constitutes a Farm.—A farm, for census purposes, is the land under one management, though consisting of different tracts, upon which agricultural products, including animals and fowls, are raised or produced. In reporting the acreage, value, and crops of each farm, care should be taken to include the acreage, value, and crops of all wood lots, pastures, meadows, plow lands, and other lands, occupied or used in connection therewith. This is to be done, although not all of such lands are situated in the same enumeration district, or are owned by the same individual, corporation, or institution. Each farm proprietor or manager should report all the land under his immediate management or supervision, but should report no land under the management of another.

Separate Tracts of Land.—Where the land owned by one person, firm, or corporation is divided among two or more tenants, or is under the management of two or more persons, the part occupied or cultivated by each must be fully reported as a separate farm in the name of its tenant or manager. In reporting a farm cultivated by its owner, do not include any land cultivated by a tenant.

Market Gardens, etc.—All considerable market, truck, and fruit gardens, nurseries, greenhouses, etc., should be reported as farms, but family gardens on city and village lots, the products of which are used exclusively for home consumption, are not to be considered farms.

Change of Owners or Tenants.—Never fail to report a farm because of a change in owner, tenant, or manager between the close of the crop year 1909 and the date of enumeration, but report it fully in the name of the person occupying farm, giving the statistics of live stock, implements, machinery, and farm values, as for any other farm. If the previous occupant is unknown or can not be reached, the enumerator must secure estimates of the crops, etc., of 1909 from the most reliable sources.

Acres.—Wherever the number of acres is required to be given, the nearest whole number should be given for tracts of three acres and over. For smaller tracts the area should be given in acres and fractional parts of an acre.

Values.—The values reported on this schedule should be, in all cases, those of local markets. The values reported for the farm and its implements and the live stock on hand should be the amounts which could be secured for them if they were sold on December 31, 1909, under fairly average conditions. The values to be reported for the crops and products of 1909 are the amounts for which the same were sold, or for which they could have been sold, on the farm or at the usual market town, when they were harvested or made ready for use or sale. Values should always be given in dollars only.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS.

- 1. Names.—For those farms conducted by one individual, either as owner, tenant, or manager, only one name is to be written in the blank. Two names, however, should be written in all cases where an owner and a tenant on shares are residing uron and identity working the forms.
- a tenant on shares are residing upon and jointly working the farm.

 3. Color or Race.—Write "W" for white; "B" for black; "Mu" for mulatto; "In" for Indian; "Mxd" for mixed or half-breed; "Ch" for Chinese; "Jp" for Japanese, as the case may be.
- 4. Country of birth.—This inquiry is to be answered as follows: If a farm is cultivated by a person born in the United States write "U. S."; if cultivated by one born in England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Canada, Germany, Austria, Hungary, or other country, write the name of the country of birth.
- 5. Tenure.—This inquiry is to be answered as follows:

Owner.—If a farm is cultivated by a person who owns all or a part of it; by a man whose wife owns all or a part of it; by a widow or widower, by the heir or heirs thereto, or by the trustee or guardian for such heirs, write "owner." For census purposes a settler on Government land who has not "proved up." a person who has bought land on a contract for a deed, or a person who holds over for redemption, is an owner and must be so marked.

Owner and Tenant.—If a farm is cultivated jointly by its owner and by one or more other persons working for a share of the farm products write "owner" after the name of the owner, and "share" after the tenant on shares.

Manager.—If the farm is cultivated for its owner, or public institution by a salaried manager, superintendent, or overseer, write "manager."

CASH TENANT.—If the farm is cultivated by a tenant who pays a fixed rental in money, or a stated amount of labor or farm commodities (not a proportionate share of all), write "cash."

TENANT ON SHARES.—If the farm is cultivated by a tenant who pays for its use a share (as out-third, or one-half, or other proportion) of the crops or products raised, write "share."

Inquirles 8 to 13.—(1) For farms occupied and conducted solely by their owners, by managers for their owners, or by the joint labor of owner and tenant, where no land is leased, rented, or hired from others in addition to that of the owner, the answer to inquiry 8 should be identical with that of inquiry 12. (2) For farms occupied solely by a tenant or renter, the answer to inquiry 8 should be identical with that of inquiry 13. (3) Where a farm occupied and conducted as in (1) includes land of the owner, and in addition land leased or hired from others, there should be answers to inquiries 12 and 13, and the sum of the acreage reported after such inquiries should be the same as that of inquiry 8, which should always be identical with that of the sum of the answers to inquiries 9, 10, and 11,

Inquiries 14 to 16.—The sum of the amounts reported after inquiries 15 and 16 should equal the amount reported after inquiry 14.

Crops of 1909.—In the three columns under the title "Crops of 1909" report the acreage of the specified crops that were harvested on the farm in 1909, the quantity of each crop harvested and its value at the nearest local market. Do not include with the acreage reported after any inquiry any area sown or planted for the crop of 1909 and not harvested by reason of crop failure. Do not report any crop harvested in 1909 on any land not belonging to the farm for which the schedule is prepared.

Grains to be Reported.—The grains to be reported after inquiry 21 are those harvested after ripening. The quantities called for are those of threshed or "shelled" grains. Where unthreshed but ripened small grain has been fed to stock, include its acreage with that of the threshed grains of the same kind, and include careful estimates of the quantity raised and its value in the columns provided for quantities and values. Crops mentioned after inquiry 21, which are cut green for hay or harvested exclusively for ensilage or forage, are to be reported after inquiry 22.

Corn.—Always report the quantity of corn harvested in bushels of shelled corn, or its equivalent. A bushel of shelled corn weighs 56 pounds, and its equivalent of dry corn on the cob is 70 pounds.

Hay and Forage.—When fields of clover, alfalfa, millet, and other grasses were mown two or more times in 1969, report the acreage of such fields only once, but give under "Quantities produced" and "Values" the total number of tons of hay and forage cut in the year and the total value of the same.

Grains cut green and used for hay or forage for cattle should not be reported under "Grains and seeds," but under their appropriate designations with the other hay and forage crops.

Unnamed Cultivated Grasses.—When crops are cultivated and harvested for hay or forage and the names of such forage crops are not given on the schedule; cross out the name of some forage crop not grown and insert the name of the specified crop and report its acreage and production as in other cases.

Vegetables for Feeding Live Stock.—When turnips, beets, carrots, and kindred vegetables are grown in the field for feeding live stock, report the total acreage and product after inquiry 22, and not after inquiry 24.

Crops not Mentioned by Name.—In the blank spaces at the end of "Miscellaneous crops" write the name and report the acreage, product, and value of any crop raised on the farm which is not mentioned by name or otherwise specifically referred to on the schedule.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS-CONTINUED

Fruits and Nuts—For farms raising orchard fruits, grapes, or nuts, report the number of trees or vines of bearing ages on the farm, and the quantities of fruits and nuts grown, and their values. When orchard fruits or nuts are grown, not mentioned by name on the schedule, write the names of such fruits or nuts on the appropriate line, and report quantities and values as for other crops.

Vegetables and Small Fruits.—When small fruits and vegetables are grown exclusively for home consumption, mark a cross (X) after the name of the vegetables or fruits so grown, in inquiries 24 and 27, and

report the total acrenge and value of the same after inquiries 28, 29, and 30. If vezetables other than those mentioned after inquiry 22 or 23, or small fruits are grown for sale, report the quantities of all such vegetables and fruits sold, and the value; and if the quantity of such crop is considerable, also report the acreage in the column provided therefor, and report the value of the vegetables and fruits consumed on the farm, as stated in the preceding sentence. When any vegetable or small fruit is grown on the farm either for home consumption or for sale, and its name is not mentioned on the schedule, write that name on a blank line of inquiry 24 or 27, and report otherwise as directed.

EXPLANATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS

On this schedule are to be reported all domestic animals, including neat cettle, horses, mules, assess, and burros, sheep, swins, goats, reindeer, and dogs, not kept on farms or on public ranges. The animals to be thus reported are in large part those kept in barns and stock yards in or near cities and villages, including those that in the summer season are allowed to grass on vacant lots in or near such cities and villages. The animals here described are to be reported in connection with the name of the proprietor of the barn or other inclosure in which they were kept December 31, 1909. Proprietors of boarding, livery, or sale stables, of stock yards, or other barns and inclosures for keeping domestic animals should report the number and value of all animals in their care on that date, including those owned by themselves and those owned by others but in their care on that date.

In reporting domestic animals observe the following special instructions: When the proprietor of any

barn or inclosure, other than a live stock dealer, or other person engaged in buying and selling animals, has in his possession three or more cows kept for their milk, and regularly milked, and the milk of such cows is used for making butter or is consumed at home, such cows and other animals kept with them should be reported on the regular farm schedule (Form 1498), and on that schedule should be reported the quantity and value of the dairy products, and other data, as called for by the schedule mentioned.

In filling this schedule, one line should be devoted to reporting each occupied barn or inclosure, and that line should be filled out on both sides of the schedule, so far as the animals kept call for report on both sides. No schedule is to be prepared for barns and inclosures in which no live stock was kept on December 31, 1009. Do not report upon this schedule animals that belong to any farm, however small. They should be reported on the general farm schedule.
