### Chapter VI.—LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS

Introduction.—A periodic counting of the principal classes of domestic animals and poultry is essential to provide information on the status and changes in the livestock industry. Likewise, the recording of the number of animals and the quantity of livestock and poultry products sold is important in measuring the relative importance of various producing areas and types and sizes of farms. The national censuses of agriculture, taken at 5-year intervals, are the sources of totals by geographic areas for both inventory numbers and production or sales and for indicating changes.

Age and sex distributions, as obtained by the census, furnish basic data in animal productivity and for the making of projections of anticipated inventories or marketings. This chapter presents information on livestock and livestock products gathered in the 1959 Census of Agriculture. Data from earlier censuses are also given to indicate the situation in earlier years and as a basis for indicating changes when such figures are reasonably comparable with those for 1959. Because of the cyclical nature of livestock inventories, data gathered at 5-year intervals may not, by themselves, indicate the direction of future changes or the full extent of change between various censuses.

Source of Data.—The data represent, in most cases, totals obtained by adding the reports for all farms. However, some data are estimates obtained by tabulating data for reports for only a sample of farms. Headnotes or footnotes to the tables indicate when the figures are estimates based on sample data. (See pages XVIII—XXIII of the Introduction to this volume for a description of the sample and for tables giving the reliability of the estimates based on reports for a sample of farms.) All data for dairy products sold and animals sold alive in 1959, except for Alaska and Hawaii, are based on reports for only a sample of farms.

All data were obtained by means of an agriculture questionnaire filled out for each farm. The inquiries regarding livestock and livestock products were generally the same for all States. The inquiries for each State are shown by the copies of the Composite Agriculture Questionnaire in the appendix of this volume. Inquiries regarding goats, mohair production, and butter churned were the only inquiries not made in all States. In case the table or a total does not include figures for all States, a footnote or headnote for the table so indicates.

Presentation of Statistics.—Statistics are presented for the United States, conterminous United States, three major regions, nine geographic divisions, and for each of the 50 States. Statistics from the 1959 census are presented along with comparable statistics from the censuses of 1954 and 1950. For items of major importance, comparable statistics from all prior censuses are given.

Both inventory and sales data are presented for each major group of animals and poultry to facilitate comparisons. Averages, percentages, and other derived data are provided as aids in using and analyzing the statistics.

Other Published Data.—Generally, all available data for totals for livestock and livestock products are presented in this chapter. Data for selected items of livestock and livestock products for farms classified by color and tenure of farm operator, by economic class of farm, and by type of farm are presented in chapters X, XI, and XII of this volume. The value of sales of livestock and livestock products, as presented in this chapter, is also shown,

together with the value of sales of other farm products, in chapter IX

Data by county, by economic class of farm, by type of farm, by size of farm, and by tenure of farm operator, for the individual States, may be found in volume I, parts 1 to 50.

Comparability of Statistics.—Many factors affect the comparability, particularly for livestock inventories, from census to census. A major factor is the time of year at which the census is taken. Therefore, the date of enumeration needs to be considered when comparing totals for the various censuses. Data for both the 1959 and 1954 censuses represent inventories made in the fall. These censuses came at or just after considerable movement of flocks and herds from one range to another, from ranch to feedlot, and from farm or ranch to market.

Increases in livestock numbers arising from births are highly seasonal. Likewise, decreases arising from marketing and from slaughter are also highly seasonal. Large numbers of livestock are marketed or slaughtered on farms during the last part of the calendar year. Thus, livestock numbers at the time of the enumeration for the 1959 Census of Agriculture were changing rapidly. The differences in livestock numbers for a census taken in the fall and one taken in January or April are considerable because of the difference in the date of the enumeration. These differences arising because of the changing of the time of the enumeration affect significantly the comparison of the numbers of most kinds of livestock and poultry not only for the same area but also for different areas.

Comparisons of livestock numbers from census to census have also been affected by change in age and sex characteristics, by wording of inquiries, by instructions, and by the order in which the inquiries appeared on the agriculture questionnaire. For example, for the 1940 census, the total for cattle and calves does not include those less than 3 months of age because of the age specification on the questionnaire for the census. A change in definition of a farm since 1954 has affected the comparability. Places reporting and number of livestock not included in the 1959 totals because of the change in farm definition are shown in table 1. The effect of the change in definition of a farm on the number of livestock is less than one percent, but the effect on the number of farms reporting is more significant.



The information given in tables 2, 3, 4, and 5 provides a brief description of the time of the year the census was taken, the wording of the inquiries, and a summary of the age and sex classification used for each census. The summaries also indicate the availability of data for various kinds and classes of livestock for each census.

For censuses prior to 1954, the inquiries and instructions on the questionnaire indicated that the inventory numbers of livestock were to be reported as of the census date. It was evident, however, that many farm operators reported the number of livestock on the farm at the time of actual enumeration. The counting of the number of livestock on the place at the time the agriculture questionnaire was filled was specified for 1959 and 1954. As the number of livestock relates to the date of enumeration, the average date of enumeration should be considered in making comparisons between censuses. The average date of enumeration for the four most recent censuses is shown by States in table 28.

For some kinds of livestock there are cyclical fluctuations in numbers even though the trend over a long period may be definitely in one direction. A census may be taken at a time when the cycle is at the peak or at any intervening point in the cycle. Therefore, the count for a kind or class of livestock for two specified periods of time does not necessarily give a true indication of either the short-time or the long-time trend in numbers. Three charts in this chapter indicate the numbers for cattle, hogs, and sheep for several censuses in relation to long-time trends in numbers.


Problems in the Enumeration of Livestock and Livestock Products.—Several problems were anticipated in connection with the enumeration of livestock and livestock products. Some of these problems were taken care of by special instructions and some by questionnaire organization and general instructions.

Some livestock operations cover large areas extending into more than one county and, occasionally, across State lines. Some farms or ranches consist of separated holdings. Other places enumerated as farms, such as feedlots, drylot dairies, and broiler-producing establishments, are of such nature that they may not be considered locally as farms. Prior to the enumeration in 1959.


lists were prepared of many of the large livestock farms and ranches as well as of unusual farms such as feedlots. One set of these lists was given to the enumerator, another to his crew leader, and a third set was retained in the central office. These lists were checked against the agriculture questionnaires by the enumerator's supervisor and again during the office processing of the questionnaires, in order to insure that such places had been enumerated.

It is not unusual for the operator of a place to feed animals or poultry or to pasture animals belonging to another person. Often the owner of the animals or poultry is not a farm operator.

To insure that all livestock would be counted in the census, the farm operator was instructed to include all poultry and animals on the place whether owned by him or by others. A further instruction was given, for those areas where applicable, to include livestock grazing on land used under a permit.

All sales of animals and poultry were to be reported for the farm from which they were sold regardless of whether the sale was made by the farm operator or by someone else. Special emphasis was placed on the inclusion of broilers sold and turkeys raised when those kinds of poultry were grown under contract.

Sales of livestock and livestock products were to be reported for the calendar year. In the 1959 census, farm operators were asked to report separately the number of live animals already sold and the number estimated to be sold between the time of enumeration and the end of the year. This separation of reports for the number sold and to be sold was designed to assure more complete reporting of all sales made during the year.

### **DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS**

In this chapter, "livestock" includes not only farm animals but also poultry. When the terms "cattle," "sheep," "hogs," etc., appear in the titles of tables, charts, or maps without qualifications as to age, animals of all ages are included.

Definitions of a farm, farms reporting, commercial farms, other farms, type of farm, class of farm, etc., are in the Introduction to this volume. An appraisal of the completeness of the 1959 census and an explanation of the enumerating, processing, and sampling procedures used also appear in the Introduction.


Values.—The values shown in this chapter were obtained by two methods. Some values were obtained directly from the farm operators. Other values were calculated using State average prices.

The State average prices used for calculating values for the conterminous United States were furnished by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. State average prices used for Alaska were computed by the Bureau of the Census from data furnished by the University of Alaska. The University of Hawaii furnished the State average prices used for Hawaii.

All values of livestock and poultry on farms represent calculated values. Values of sales represent enumerated values for some items and calculated values for other items. The method used to obtain the value should be considered when making comparisons between one census and another. The method used to obtain values of individual items of livestock and livestock products for each census is shown in table 4.

Horses and Mules.—For 1959, an inquiry asking for the total number of horses, mules, colts, and ponies was made in 49 States. In Hawaii, the inquiry did not specify that mules were to be included. For 1954, there were separate inquiries on the agriculture questionnaire for horses and mules for 15 Southern States.


Many of the horses enumerated in a census are not work animals. No attempt has been made in recent censuses to segregate work animals from animals kept for other purposes.



Cattle.—Inventory numbers of cattle were obtained by means of four inquiries in 1959 and 1954. The first asked for the total number of cattle and calves of all ages on the place at the time of the enumeration. This inquiry was followed by three questions designed to separate the total into three groups: (1) Cows, including heifers that have calved; (2) heifers, excluding any that have calved; and (3) bulls, bull calves, steers, and steer calves.


Age was not specified for the classifying of cattle as cows, heifers, and calves. The classification of cattle and calves into the three groups was left to the farm operator and the census enumerator.


The number of milk cows was obtained by an inquiry in connection with milk production at the time of enumeration. Farm operators were asked, first for the number of cows and heifers




milked the day preceding the enumeration and then the question, "How many milk cows were on this place yesterday? (Include dry milk cows and milk heifers that have calved.)"

All cows milked were considered to be milk cows regardless of whether kept only for the production of milk used on the place or of milk for sale.





Whole Milk and Cream Sold.—Data for whole milk and cream relate to the entire calendar year 1959. The data presented are estimates (except for Alaska and Hawaii) based upon tabulation of reports obtained for a sample of farms. All milk and cream sold from the farm (except quantities purchased from some other place and then resold) was to be included, regardless of who shared the receipts.

The questionnaire provided alternative units of measure for reporting the quantity of whole milk sold for all States except Hawaii. The units of measure specified were: Pounds, gallons, and pounds of butterfat for States in the conterminous United States; pounds and gallons for Alaska; and quarts for Hawaii.

The quantity of whole milk sold is published in pounds. Conversion from gallons to pounds was made by multiplying the number of gallons by 8.6. Pounds of butterfat in whole milk sold were converted into pounds of milk on the basis of the average butterfat content of milk in each State as furnished by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Cream sold was enumerated in pounds of butterfat in 49 States. The inquiry regarding cream sold was not made in Hawaii. In tables showing total pounds of milk sold, cream was converted into equivalent pounds of whole milk sold. The conversion factors used are shown by States in table 28.







Hogs.—The inventory number of hogs was obtained through the use of three inquiries. The first asked the total number of hogs and pigs of all ages including sows and boars, followed by questions for the number in each of two groups: (1) Born since June 1, and (2) born before June 1.


Two inquiries were made to obtain the number of litters farrowed. The first inquiry asked for the number of litters farrowed since June 1, 1959, and before Dec. 1, 1959. The second inquiry asked for the number of litters farrowed between


Dec. 1, 1958, and June 1, 1959. The total for these two inquiries represents the number of litters farrowed during the 12-month period Dec. 1, 1958, through Nov. 30, 1959.


There was underreporting for the number of litters. The extent of the underreporting was greater outside than for the principal hog-producing areas. The underreporting was greater for the number of litters farrowed between Dec. 1, 1958, and June 1, 1959, than during the period of June 1 to Nov. 30, 1959.













Sheep and Wool.—The inquiries regarding sheep and lamb inventories were the same for all States. One inquiry obtained the total number of sheep and lambs of all ages. Three additional inquiries were made to distribute the total into three groups: (1) Lambs under 1 year old, (2) ewes 1 year old and over, and (3) rams and wethers 1 year old and over.

Data on shearings and on amount of wool shorn were obtained separately for lambs and for other sheep in 1959. The separation is not shown in this volume. However, volume I does show the separate data by counties for each State. Wool shorn was to be reported in pounds on a grease-weight basis of all wool shorn, whether from one or two shearings of each animal.





Goats and Mohair.—In 1959, goats were enumerated in 11 States—Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Missouri, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, and Utah. The inquiry was as follows: "How many goats and kids of all ages are on this place?"

In the nine States of the conterminous United States the total was further classified as Angora or other goats. The number of goats and kids clipped and the quantity of mohair (in pounds) was also obtained for these nine States.

The number of milk goats was obtained only for Alaska. The value of goat milk sold was obtained only for Hawaii.

Animals Sold Alive.—Data for the number and value of animals sold alive in 1959, except for Alaska and Hawaii, are estimates based on reports for only a sample of farms. Corresponding data for 1954 represent totals obtained by adding the reports for all farms. Tables 3, 4, and 5 show the items obtained and indicate the comparability of statistics for the various censuses.

For 1959, for the conterminous United States, farm operators were asked to report separately the number of live animals already sold at the time of enumeration and the number estimated to be sold between the time of enumeration and the end of the calendar year. This procedure was designed to assure more complete reporting of all animal sales made during the year.


For meat animals, both sales to other farm operators and sales to central markets would be reported. Since no attempt was made to confine sales to animals for immediate slaughter, the totals for animals sold alive should exceed the number slaughtered in meat-processing plants.

Livestock slaughter figures are compiled periodically by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Table 6 in the text presents, for the conterminous United States, a comparison of the number of cattle, hogs, and sheep sold alive as shown by the census with

the estimated number of these animals slaughtered, excluding farm slaughter, for the three most recent censuses.





**Poultry.**—The information obtained for poultry and poultry products was the same for all States except Alaska. For Alaska, the total value of all poultry and poultry products sold was obtained for each farm. For all other States, the value of chickens and chicken eggs sold was calculated.

Two questions relating to chickens sold were on the questionnaire for the 1959 census. These questions were designed to provide data for commercial broilers separate from other chickens sold. The agriculture questionnaire and the instructions did not contain a definition of broilers. In many localities






the term was considered as applying to all young chickens sold. Generally, when less than 2,000 broilers were reported as sold on an individual farm, they were counted as other chickens sold. During the office processing, inconsistencies indicating misunderstanding regarding the classification of broilers and other chickens were corrected on the basis of related data on the questionnaire. If the number was large enough to significantly affect county totals, the farm operator was contacted either by letter or by telephone to determine the correct classification.


An accurate enumeration of broilers sold is difficult because of the varied contract arrangements under which broilers are

produced. A large proportion of the broilers is produced under contract made by the farm operator with a processor, feed dealer, or other person. The contracts vary from producer to producer. A farmer may produce one lot of broilers under one type of contract arrangement and additional lots under another type. Usually more than one lot of broilers is produced during the year, and the farm operator may not always recall all the lots sold. To help in obtaining as complete an enumeration as possible, in 1959 lists of large broiler producers were prepared and checks were made to see that all these producers were included in the census.




Two inquiries were made regarding turkeys in 1959. One inquiry obtained the number of turkeys raised during the year 1959. The other inquiry obtained the number of turkey hens

on hand at the time of enumeration that were to be kept for breeding in 1960.



For poultry, other than chickens and turkeys, the number sold was obtained for 1959, whereas, for 1954 the census obtained the number raised. Data for ducks, geese, and guineas sold are


presented for States in table 60. Data for pigeons, pheasants, quail, etc., were not obtained separately although their sales are included in the total for other poultry products sold.



# CHANGES IN LIVESTOCK AND LIVESTOCK SALES


The two most important changes in livestock production during recent years have been the substantial reduction in the number of farms engaged in the production of livestock and livestock products and the increasing concentration of a significant part of the livestock production on a relatively small number of farms.





Farms reporting cattle declined almost 1 million from 1954 to 1959. There was less than one-half as many farms with cattle in 1959 as in 1920. From 1954 to 1959, the number of farms reporting milk cows declined more than 1.1 million. The number of farms with milk cows in 1959 was only two-fifths of the number of farms with milk cows in 1920. The quantity of milk sold and the number of cattle and calves sold have increased significantly during the last 20 years. However, the number


## FARMS REPORTING MILK COWS BY SIZE OF HERD: 1940 TO 1959



of farms reporting the sale of whole milk declined 18 percent from 1954 to 1959. The number of farms reporting whole milk sold in 1959 was only 66 percent of the number in 1944. The number of farms reporting cattle and calves sold was 12 percent less in 1959 than in 1954 and 24 percent less than in 1944.












The number of hogs and pigs sold has been increasing during the last 20 years, yet the number of farms reporting hogs and pigs was 22 percent less in 1959 than in 1954 and was less than half the number of farms reporting in 1939. Hogs and pigs were sold by only three-fifths as many farms in 1959 as in 1949.

The rapid decline starting in the 1920's in the number of farms reporting horses and mules and the number of horses and mules on farms continued throughout the 1954 to 1959 period. By 1959, only 26 percent as many farms reported horses and mules as in 1940 and the number of horses and mules had declined from a peak of more than 25 million in 1920 to fewer than 3 million in 1959.

The number of farms with chickens declined almost 1.3 million from 1954 to 1959. Only about half as many farms reported chickens in 1959 as in 1950. From 1949 to 1959, the number of farms reporting chickens sold declined more than half.



The disappearance of small herds and flocks accounted for most of the decrease in the number of farms reporting livestock and poultry. From 1954 to 1959, 72 percent of the decline in the number of farms reporting cattle and calves was accounted for by the decline in the number of farms with fewer than 10 cattle and calves. Likewise, the decline in the number of farms with fewer than 10 milk cows accounted for 88 percent of the decrease in farms reporting milk cows from 1954 to 1959. The decline of nearly 3 million in the number of farms reporting chickens from 1940 to 1959 was largely the result of the disappearance of 2.6 million small flocks of fewer than 100 chickens.

The number of large producers of livestock and livestock products and of poultry and poultry products is increasing rapidly and a substantial part of livestock and poultry production is produced by these large-scale specialized producers.

### NUMBER OF MILK COWS BY SIZE OF HERD: 1940 TO 1959







The production of poultry and poultry products has become highly commercialized and there has been a striking increase in specialization in poultry production during the last 5 years. From 1954 to 1959, the number of turkeys raised increased 31 percent and the sales of eggs and broilers increased 25 percent and 78 percent, respectively. In 5 years, the number of farms reporting turkeys raised declined 49 percent and the number of farms reporting sales of eggs and broilers decreased 37 percent and 17 percent, respectively.

# NUMBER OF CHICKENS ON HAND BY SIZE OF FLOCK: 1940 TO 1959




The production of most poultry products is now concentrated on a relatively small number of commercial poultry farms. The 103,000 farms obtaining a half or more of the value of all farm products sold from the sale of poultry and poultry products accounted for 97 percent of the broilers sold, 56 percent of the eggs sold, and 93 percent of the turkeys raised in 1959. The 5,000 commercial poultry farms, each with 6,400 or more chickens 4 months old and over, accounted for over one-fifth of all the eggs sold in 1959. The 15,700 commercial poultry farms with sales of 30,000 or more broilers each accounted for 75 percent of all broilers sold in 1959. The 4,700 commercial poultry farms reporting the raising of 3,200 or more turkeys each in 1959, accounted for 88 percent of all turkeys raised in 1959.

For the United States, 56 percent of the farms reporting chickens have flocks of fewer than 50 chickens 4 months old and over; however, these farms account for less than 8 percent of the chickens on hand, and the average number of chickens 4 months old and over on these farms was 23 in 1959. Of the 1.2 million farms having fewer than 50 chickens on hand, almost 1 million reported no eggs sold in 1959. Less than 3 percent of the farms reporting chickens had 800 or more chickens on hand in 1959 but these farms had 51 percent of the chickens and produced 61 percent of the eggs sold in 1959. Commercial poultry farms having 6,400 or more chickens 4 months old or over on hand, marketed 39 percent of the eggs sold from commercial poultry farms in 1959. The number of farms having flocks of 3,200 or more chickens 4 months old and over doubled from 1954 to 1959. These farms had 35 percent of all chickens


4 months old and over on all commercial farms in 1959. Farms having flocks of 3,200 or more sold 39.7 percent of the eggs in 1959 as compared with only 17.6 percent in 1954.

Approximately one-half of the farms with chickens did not report any eggs sold in 1959. Of the 1.1 million farms selling eggs, 598,000, or 54 percent, sold less than 800 dozens and accounted for less than 4 percent of all eggs sold. The 31,000 farms, each selling 20,000 or more dozens of eggs, comprised less than 3 percent of the farms selling eggs, but reported 52 percent of all eggs sold. The 12,000 farms, each selling 50,000 or more dozens, reported 36 percent of all eggs sold.

Farms reporting broilers sold decreased from 50,000 in 1954 to 42,000 in 1959; however, the number of broilers sold increased from 796 million to 1,420 million during the same period. The number of farms reporting fewer than 16,000 broilers sold decreased by over 53 percent from 1954 to 1959. Farms with 60,000 or more broilers sold increased from 1,687 in 1954 to 6,102 in 1959. These 6,102 farms, each with 60,000 or more broilers sold, accounted for almost half of all broilers sold in 1959.

A large proportion of the broilers sold is produced on a relatively few specialized poultry farms. Only 42,000 farms reported broilers sold in 1959. Of these, 37,000, or 89 percent, were commercial poultry farms and 97 percent of all broilers

sold in 1959 were from these farms. Over 28 percent of the broilers were sold from 2,254 farms, each selling 100,000 or more broilers in 1959.

Only half as many farms reported turkeys raised in 1959 as in 1954. The number of turkeys raised in 1959 was 80.4 million compared with 61.8 million in 1954, and 36.4 million in 1949. Approximately 73,000 out of the 88,000 farms raising turkeys raised less than 50 turkeys each in 1959. (The average number of turkeys raised per farm for these farms was 9.4.) The 6,600 farms raising 1,600 or more turkeys in 1959 accounted for 96 percent of all the turkeys raised. The 2,144 farms with 10,000 or more turkeys raised in 1959 accounted for 70 percent of all turkeys raised and the average number of turkeys raised per farm for these farms was over 26,000.
