


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-General Information

INTRODUCTION

The main purpose of this guide is to present information about the 1982 Census of Agriculture, but it also covers related statistics from other Bureau of the Census economic and demographic censuses and surveys.

The census of agriculture is the only source of statistics on U.S. agriculture where the figures are comparable county by county and classify farms by size, tenure, type of organization, principal occupation and age of operator, market value of agricultural products sold, and Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) code.

Data from the census are used by the Administration, Congress, and Federal, State, and county government organizations, as well as the business community, scientific and educational institutions, and farmer organizations.

- U.S. Government agencies use agriculture census data on production, sales, and size and type of farm as part of the framework for such composite measures as the gross national product, farm income estimates and indexes of productivity and price levels.
- The U.S. Department of Agriculture uses census of agriculture data to establish benchmarks or comparisons for many of its periodic estimates and projections.
- Administrative and legislative bodies at all levels of government use the census data in developing farm and rural programs and in analyzing the results of such programs.
- Private businesses, farm cooperatives, and commodity and trade associations rely on the census data as an aid in locating new plants and service and distribution facilities, allocating research resources, forecasting markets, selecting marketing areas, and in other activities that provide better service to the farm community.
- Farm and agriculture-oriented magazines and other news media use census data to provide technical background for news stories and feature articles, to determine their share of the market, and to identify what types of farms they reach.

LEGAL AUTHORITY AND CONFIDENTIALITY

The census of agriculture is required by law. Title 13, United States Code, directs that a census of agriculture be taken in 1983, covering 1982, and every fifth year thereafter. The law also imposes joint responsibilities on respondents and the Bureau and specifies penalties for noncompliance. Respondents are required to supply the data requested, while the Bureau is directed to maintain the confidentiality of the data supplied. No data may be published that can be used to identify an individual or a par-

ticular farm, nor may the data furnished by respondents be used for any but statistical purposes. Only sworn officials or employees of the Bureau of the Census may have access to the individual census records.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The first census of agriculture for the United States was taken in 1840. Agriculture censuses were conducted every 10 years, as part of the decennial census of population program until 1920. Then they were carried out every 5 years until 1978, when a temporary 4-year cycle was introduced to bring the agriculture and economic censuses into conjunction for 1982. Thereafter, agriculture and economic censuses will occur on a common 5-year cycle.

Agriculture censuses were conducted by personal-visit interview until the Bureau of the Census introduced the mailout/mailback method for the 1969 Census of Agriculture. Since 1969, the census has been conducted primarily by mail enumeration in the 50 States. The personal-visit interview technique is used for the censuses of agriculture in Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and in American Samoa and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.¹

THE 1982 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Scope and Content

The 1982 Census of Agriculture covered all agriculture operations that met the Bureau's definition of a farm (see p.2) in the 50 States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. All agriculture operations were asked to provide data on:

Acreage

Crops

Fruits and nuts

Vegetables

Nursery and greenhouse products

Value of sales

Land use

Irrigation and source of irrigation water

¹Censuses of agriculture in American Samoa and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands are carried out in conjunction with the decennial censuses of population and housing. For 1980, however, the government of the Trust Territory carried out its own agriculture census; only the Northern Mariana Islands (part of the Trust Territory but functioning autonomously) took part in the census of agriculture carried out concurrently with the 1980 Census of Population and Housing (but published as part of the 1978 Census of Agriculture data program).

Livestock and poultry

Animal specialties

Amount received from Government Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loans

Amount received for machine work, customwork and other agricultural services provided for others

Type of organization

Characteristics and occupation of operator

Year operator began operating farm

Additional information was requested only from a 20-percent sample of operators made up of all operations with expected sales above a certain value and a random sample of all other farms in each county. A 20-percent sample was small enough to limit respondent burden but was large enough to provide reliable country-level estimates for:

Use of fertilizers and chemicals Selected production expenses Machinery and equipment Market value of land and buildings Interest expense

Reference Dates

Inventory data for the 50 States were requested as of December 31, 1982, while other data (except for a few crops, such as citrus, for which data were collected for the production year) were requested for calendar year 1982. In Puerto Rico, inventory data were collected as of July 1, 1983 and other data for the 12 months ending June 30, 1983. For Guam and the Virgin Islands, inventory data were collected as of the date of enumeration and production data for the 12 months preceding enumeration.

Definition of a Farm

For the 50 States, the census definition of a farm was any place that had, or normally would have had, a total value of sales of agricultural products during the census year of \$1,000 or more. For Puerto Rico, a farm was any place that had, or normally would have had, a total value of sales during the census year of \$500 or more or that had 10 cuerdas (9.7 acres) or more and sales of \$100 or more. In Guam, a farm was any place on which any crops, vegetables, or fruits were harvested or gathered in 1982 or on which there were any livestock or 15 or more poultry at the time of the enumeration. For the Virgin Islands, a farm was any place of 3 acres or more on which any field crops or vegetables were harvested in the 12 months between July 1, 1982 and June 30, 1983 or on which there was a combined total of 10 or more fruit or nut trees or plants, any livestock, or 10 poultry or more. Places of less than 3 acres were counted as farms if they had, or would normally have had, a total value of sales of agricultural products of \$100 or more.

General Procedures

The 1982 Census of Agriculture in the 50 States was a mail census; i.e., report forms were mailed to names and addresses assembled by the Bureau in an agriculture census mailing list. Addressees were asked to complete the report forms and mail

them back to the Bureau. Nonrespondents were followed up by mail and telephone over a period of 7 months following the initial mailout. The censuses in Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands were conducted by interviewers visiting farms to complete the report forms.

The Bureau reviewed the forms as they were returned, and the data were transferred to computer tape for a series of computer edits. As each State or area was "closed out" (i.e., once an acceptable overall level of response had been achieved), the data were tabulated with estimates for those who did not respond, and the data publication for a State or area was prepared.

Geographic Area Detail

The 1982 Census of Agriculture provides data for the United States, the 50 States, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands, and for more than 3,000 counties or their equivalents. For census purposes, the United States is the 50 States and the District of Columbia (although no data report was prepared for the latter as part of the 1982 Census of Agriculture); Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands are treated separately. County equivalents include parishes in Louisiana and municipios in Puerto Rico. Data are published for the three main islands of the Virgin Islands and election districts in Alaska and Guam. State or area totals are aggregates of the county or county equivalent totals or estimates, while the United States data are aggregates of the State counts.

THE STANDARD INDUSTRIAL CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

The Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) system is used to classify economic establishments, including agricultural production. The agriculture census publications include data for agricultural operations tabulated by SIC classification. The SIC system assigns numeric codes to specific economic activities, the focus of each code category narrowing with each successive addition of a digit. For example, SIC major group 01 covers agricultural production-crops. Adding the digit "1" gives the SIC group code for cash grains (011). To designate a specific type of grain production, a fourth digit gives the "industry" code, e.g., 0112-rice. A farm is "primarily" engaged in a particular crop-production or other agricultural activity if that activity or crop accounts for 50 percent or more of the total value of sales of the farm's agricultural production. If the total value of sales for agricultural products for a farm is less than 50 percent from a single four-digit industry, but 50 percent or more of its sales are derived from two or more industries within the same SIC group (e.g., corn (SIC 0115) and soybeans (0116)), the farm is classified as a miscellaneous establishment within that SIC group (O11); otherwise it is classified as a general crop farm (SIC 0191).

Data in the economic censuses, except for portions of the census of transportation, are collected and summarized based on the SIC system. The four-digit industry code is generally sufficient for SIC coverage of agricultural production, since it identifies individual types of farms, but some industries, including

a number of manufacturing industries closely related to agriculture, require more detailed codes to differentiate between specific products. This has led the Bureau to develop some 1,400 five-digit "product class" SIC codes and approximately 11,000 seven-digit "product" codes, which enable the Bureau to break down the major SIC codes to the specific product level. The following illustrates how the system works:

HOW THE DATA ARE PUBLISHED

The publication schedule for the agriculture and economic census reports described here and elsewhere in these pages appears on an insert to this *Guide*.

Census data are published in a variety of media: printed reports, microfiche, and computer tape. Most printed reports and microfiche can be purchased from the U.S. Government Printing Office, while the Bureau of the Census is the only source of computer tapes of the census data. For more information on obtaining Bureau products, as well as on reference sources, special tabulations, etc., see chapter 4, "Obtaining the Data."

The printed reports are also reproduced on microfiche. Most of these same summary statistics are issued as well on publicuse computer tapes.

A microfiche is a 4" x 6" sheet of photographic film containing up to 98 frames (or pages) of tables, text, or other printed material, reduced 24 times from their original size. Many libraries have the equipment needed to read microfiche and produce paper prints of individual pages; this equipment also is available commercially. Except as noted in the report series descriptions elsewhere in this guide, the Bureau issues fiche on a report-by-report basis; that is, one report is published on one or more fiche, and the entire report must be purchased.

The Bureau's agriculture computer tapes are available in 9-track, 1600-bpi (bits per inch) or 6250-bpi recording density, and in the Extended Binary-Coded Decimal interchange Code (EBCDIC) recording language. The agriculture census data will also be available in the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) software package. The unit of issue for the public-use tapes is the file; each file corresponds to a particular State (including substate areas within it) or the entire Nation. There are a number of different files for most subject areas.

In addition, some unpublished data series, which provide more detail than the printed reports, are made available on both microfiche and computer tape.

Information From the 1982 Census of Agriculture

GENERAL INFORMATION

The 1982 Census of Agriculture publication program consists of *Preliminary Reports* for each of over 3,000 counties, each State, and the United States; a final Volume 1, *Geographic Area Series, State and County Data*, report for the United States, each State, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands; *Final County Reports* for each county in the United States with 10 or more farms; and the Volume 2, *Subject Series*, which consists of three parts: the *Graphic Summary*, the *Coverage Evaluation*, and the *Ranking of States and Counties*. These report series are described in greater detail below.

HISTORICAL DATA

All of the agriculture census reports include historical statistics from one, and sometimes two, preceding censuses. Summary tables on farms, land in farms, and land use in the volume 1 reports usually show historical data for several earlier censuses.

The comparability of historical data may not be exact; the definition of a farm and the method of enumeration have changed periodically. For example, the mail enumeration in the 1978 Census of Agriculture was supplemented by an area segment sample survey that employed personal-visit interviews of all households in a sample of area segments in all States except Alaska and Hawaii. This survey obtained estimates of the number and characteristics of farms not on the mailing list. These estimates were added to the results of the mail list enumeration in the State- and National-level tabulations. Plans for a similar program for 1982 were dropped because of budget constraints.

The State and national data from 1978 shown in the 1982 publications have been adjusted to make them comparable with the 1982 data. This was done by subtracting the estimates derived from the 1978 area sample from the 1978 totals.

Users should note any restrictions or explanations included in texts, or in table footnotes, with respect to comparability.

PUBLISHED REPORTS

The publication schedule for the agriculture and economic census reports described here and elsewhere in these pages appears on an insert to this *Guide*.

Volume 1, Geographic Area Series, State and County Data, : * * * + † , * series AC82-A-1 to -54. Volume 1 includes a United States summary, with data for States, and separate reports for each of the 50 States, Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands. Each report consists of an introductory text and two chapters of statistical tables, one of detailed data for the State (or area), the second of detailed county-level tables.

In chapter 1 (State data), tables 1 through 43 show detailed State-level data. These cover all the items collected in the census: farms, land in farms, and land use for 1982 and earlier census years; crop production and value of sales; livestock and

¹Agricultural data were collected in American Samoa and the Northern Mariana Islands in connection with the 1980 Census of Population but were published as part of the 1978 Census of Agriculture publication program.

²State and county preliminary report series numbers are derived from the Federal Information Processing Standards (FIPS) code list, in which a two-digit code identifies each State and that number, plus a three-digit county code, identifies each county within a State. Preliminary report AC82-A-24-029(P), for example, is the 1982 Census of Agriculture preliminary report ("(P)") for Maryland's ("24") Kent County ("029"). Users should be aware that FIPS codes are not assigned in strict numerical sequence, nor are they used in the final reports series.

³County-level statistics on computer tape are sold by Customer Services, Data User Services Division; State-level data and cross-tabulations are sold on a special-order basis by the Agriculture Division.

poultry inventories; selected characteristics of farms operated by females, persons of Spanish origin, and specified racial groups; irrigation; tenure and operator characteristics; payroll, employment, and contract labor; value of machinery and equipment; agricultural chemicals used; selected production expenses; fuel storage capacity and fuel expenses; Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loans, agricultural services, and direct sales of agricultural products; and characteristics of farms by SIC classifications. Tables 44 through 50 show selected 1982 summary State data cross-tabulated by various farm classifications, such as size of farm, tenure of operator, type of organization, value of agricultural products sold; various operator characteristics (e.g., age and principal occupation); and SIC code.

Selected data are presented by county or county-equivalent in chapter 2. Tables 1 through 16 provide data for all counties

on land, land in farms, and land use; irrigation; value of products sold and farms by SIC classification; land in farms, cropland harvested, and irrigated land by size of farm; tenure and charactistics of operator; agricultural chemicals used; machinery and equipment; hired farm labor and payroll; CCC loans, agricultural services, and direct sales of agricultural products; livestock and poultry inventories and sales; etc. The counties are listed alphabetically in the column headings. In tables 17 through 36, data are shown only for counties with three or more farms reporting a particular item. Items shown include various animal and crop specialties (goats, mink, bees, fish sales, grains, field seeds, etc.), nursery and greenhouse products, tenure, farms operated by persons of selected racial groups or Spanish origin, CCC loans by commodity group, etc. Data for counties with fewer than three farms reporting any given item are combined into an "all other counties" category for the State.

This allows data users to obtain basic statistics from the final census counts for only those counties in which they have an interest.

Volume 2, Subject Series, ☐ \; **, series AC82-SS-1 to -3. This series consists of three reports:

Graphic Summary (AC82-SS-1) presents a profile of the Nation's agriculture in a series of U.S. maps, many of which are printed in color.


Coverage Evaluation (AC82-SS-2) provides national- and regional-level estimates on the completeness of the census, in terms of both the number of farms missed and selected characteristics of those farms.

Ranking of States and Counties (AC82-SS-3) shows the ranking of States and counties in order of importance for selected items for 1982. Comparative data from the 1978 census are included for most tables.

INTRODUCTION

General Information

The census of agriculture is the major source of production, economic, land-value, farm practices, and other information on the agricultural sector. Related data on the food and fiber system are collected in other Bureau censuses and surveys. These include the economic censuses and related periodic surveys, the census and surveys of governments, and the foreign trade statistics program. Demographic information on the farm and rural populations can be obtained from the decennial censuses of population and housing and in the current population survey program.

The data available from these various statistical programs are described briefly below.

Geography of the Censuses of Population and Housing and of the Economic Censuses

Decennial and economic census data are compiled and published for two large areas outside the normal geographic hierarchy: standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's) and standard consolidated statistical areas (SCSA's). An SMSA is an integrated economic and social unit with a recognized large population nucleus. Generally, an SMSA consists of one or more counties (except in New England where SMSA's are comprised of cities and towns) or their equivalents, that meet specified standards pertaining to population, commuting patterns, and metropolitan character. An SMSA may include one or more predominantly agricultural counties. As of January 1982, there were 323 SMSA's, including 5 in Puerto Rico.

An SCSA is a statistical unit used to facilitate the presentation and analysis of data for large concentrations of metropolitan population. Each SCSA has a population of at least 1 million and consists of two or more adjacent SMSA's that together meet specified standards of urbanized character, social and economic integration, and/or contiguity of urbanized areas. As of January 1982, there were 17 designated SCSA's, including 1 in Puerto Rico.¹

Population, housing, and economic data are shown for a variety of subcounty geographic units not represented in the agriculture census reports.

THE ECONOMIC CENSUSES

General Information

The economic censuses cover all establishments² engaged in manufacturing, mining, retail and wholesale trades, construction, and most service industries. Agricultural services, as defined in the SIC system (SIC major group 07), are not included in the economic censuses. Title 13, United States Code, requires that economic censuses be carried out every 5 years for years ending in "2" and "7" and specifies which industries must be covered.

The data collected vary with the characteristics of the different industries, but a number of key measures, such as sales (or receipts or value of shipments), employment, and payroll, are collected in nearly all economic census programs. Data on products sold or services performed, inventories, capital expenditures, and materials consumed are provided for most industries.

Sources of Agriculture-Related Information


General information. In the economic statistics program the censuses and surveys of manufactures, wholesale and retail trade, and transportation, and the County Business Patterns are the primary sources of economic data related to agriculture. The censuses collected information (see fig. 1, p. 11) on establishments involved in the manufacture of products used in agricultural production, in the processing and/or sale of agricultural products of all kinds, or in providing certain goods and services to farmers and/or their families. The census of manufactures, for example, collects and publishes information on establishments involved in processing food and kindred products, while the census of retail trade covers food stores.

When selected agriculture-related data from the economic censuses are combined with agriculture census statistics, a more complete picture can be obtained of the food and fiber sector of the economy.

^{&#}x27;After the relationships between central urban core(s) and adjacent counties were analyzed on the basis of the 1980 population census and a revised set of standards, these areas were redefined and the word 'standard' was dropped from the designation. Thus, as of June 30, 1983, SMSA's and SCSA's are known as metropolitan statistical areas (MSA's), primary MSA's (PMSA's), and consolidated MSA's (CMSA's). As the 1982 agriculture and economic censuses cover calendar year 1982, prior to the June 1983 date for adopting the changes, the 1982 SMSA and SCSA designations and nomenclature were retained for these censuses. Special reports using some of the new designations may be issued after the 1982 census results have been published.

The 1982 Census of Manufactures. This census covered manufacturing industries and collected data on employment, payroll and worker hours, inventories, capital expenditures, cost of materials and contract work, resales, fuel and electricity, ownership and control, and products. (Supplementary data are obtained on plant characteristics for selected industries.)

The publication program for the 1982 Census of Manufactures includes the following report series:

Approximately 450 manufacturing industries are covered in 443 separate reports that present general statistics for each State with significant manufacturing activity, plus a summary report, MC82-SUM-1(P), for the United States. Preliminary totals for quantity and value of shipments for the products primary to the industry and the quantity and cost of materials consumed by establishments classified in the industry are also shown. General statistics for industry groups and industries are presented in the preliminary summary publication along with totals at the all-manufacturing level. The census of retail trade covered establishments primarily engaged in selling merchandise to the general public for personal or household consumption and in rendering services incidental to the sales of those goods. The 1982 Census of Transportation. The census of transportation provides statistics for selected transportation industries on the characteristics and uses of trucks, on the shipments of commodities by manufacturers, and on personal travel. The 1982 program has two major components: a truck inventory and use survey and a commodity transportation survey, the latter scheduled for 1983.

The publication program for the census of transportation includes the following report series of particular interest to agricultural census data users:

Truck Inventory and Use Survey, \(\ldots \rightarrow \display \), TC82-T1 to -52. A report for each State and the District of Columbia and a United States summary, on the number of vehicles and other characteristics, by size class, principal products carried, fleet size, and area of operation (local, short range, or long range). The U.S. summary statistics are aggregates of the State data.

Commodity Transportation Survey (CTS) provides statistics on the volume and characteristics of intercity commodity shipments originated by manufacturers in the 50 States and the District of Columbia. The 1977 CTS data were published in a Geographic Area Series, ### \$\mathbb{\Phi}\$+, TC77-CA; a Commodity Report Series, #### \$\mathbb{\Phi}\$+, TC77-CC; and in a Com-

Enterprise Statistics. This program regroups census data records of establishments and farms under common ownership or control, to show various economic characteristics of the owning or controlling firms. Each company covered in the 1982 Economic and Agriculture Censuses is classified in one of approximately 200 enterprise categories, which are regroupings of four-digit SIC industries. Statistics for enterprise-establishment relationships are tabulated by type of company organization, company size, and industry classification. Other cross-tabulations indicate patterns of company industrial diversification. The tabulations in General Report on Industrial Organization, \(\Pi\) \(

CURRENT ECONOMIC STATISTICS

General Information

The Bureau of the Census carries out an extensive program of periodic economic surveys, most of which are based on probability samples, to provide additional statistical information on the Nation's economy. This program includes a survey of cotton ginnings, annual and monthly surveys of wholesale and retail trade, an annual survey of manufactures, and a county business patterns survey.

The Cotton Ginnings Survey

The Bureau of the Census has carried out a cotton ginnings program since 1902. Ginning data are reported and collected twice monthly during the ginning season (August through March)

for 17 States.3 The results of the survey are published in a series of three reports: the A10-biweekly data on the number of bales ginned by State \square (subscription *, single copies +) $\boxplus +$; the A20-monthly data on the number of bales ginned for each county with three or more ginning establishments (subscription *, single copies +) ## +; and the A30-final annual figures for cotton ginnings and production for the United States, States, and counties, as well as the 100 top ginning counties. The data published include the number of active and idle gins, average net weight of bales ginned (for the U.S. and for States), amount of American Pima cotton ginned, percent of total cotton ginned by specific dates (for the U.S. and for States), and number of cotton gins by State and by number of bales ginned. III ## +(Additional data on establishments dealing with cotton are presented in the Current Industrial Reports series M22P, Consumption on the Cotton System and Stocks. See p. 17.)

Other Economic Surveys

Manufactures. An annual survey of manufactures is carried out each year during the period between economic censuses. The data from the latest (1981) survey were tabulated and published in five reports as the Annual Survey of Manufactures, \square \Longrightarrow + (series M81(AS)-1 to -5); two of these, M81(AS)-1, Statistics for Industry Groups and Industries, and M81(AS)-2, Value of Product Shipments, may be of particular interest to agriculture census data users.

The Current Industrial Reports, (subscription or single copies*, back issues +) ### +, are a series of over 100 monthly, quarterly, and annual reports providing national-level summary data for selected manufactured products. All monthly and quarterly series include annual summaries or separate, more detailed annual reports.

Current Industrial Reports of particular interest to agriculture data users and the kinds of data collected in each, are shown in the table on p. 17.

Wholesale Trade. Two periodic series of reports on wholesale trade are published by the Bureau. The Monthly Wholesale Trade: Sales and Inventories, (subscription * or single copies +) ## +, series BW, provides monthly reports on selected kinds of businesses. Data are shown at the national level for sales, inventories, and stock (inventory) sales ratios, with percentage changes and estimated dollar volume. The January report each year contains all of the final data for the previous year. The Annual Wholesale Trade, (part of monthly subscription * or single copies +), ## +, series BW, is an annual report providing national-level estimates of annual sales, year-end inventories, and inventory-sales ratios by selected kinds of businesses. Historical data are included.

Retail Trade. Three periodic retail trade reports are published by the Bureau. The first of these, the Advance Monthly Retail Sales, \(\leftilde{\text{\text{Sales}}} \) (subscription or single copies +) \(\ext{\text{\text{\text{\text{III}}}}} +, \text{series CB}, \text{provides advance estimates of sales by kind-of-business groups at the national level. by major kind-of-business groups and selected individual kinds of retail businesses at the national level, for census regions and divisions, 19 States, 23 large SMSA's, and 5 cities. An annual report, [year] Retail Trade, [] | + , series BR shows national data on sales, year-end inventories, inventory-sales ratios, and accounts receivable balances.

County Business Patterns. The County Business Patterns, [1] * 🛗 🕑 + , series CBP (year), reports present intercensal economic data at the State and county levels for the following sectors of the economy in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico: agricultural services, forestry, and fisheries; mining; contract construction; manufacturing; transportation and other public utilities (except railroads and the U.S. Postal Service); wholesale trade; retail trade; finance, insurance, and real estate; and services, including religious organizations. Data are shown on the number of establishments, employment, payroll, and the number of establishments by employment-size class. A U.S. summary includes data by four-digit SIC level for the United States as well as State totals and, by two-digit SIC, the number of administrative and auxiliary establishments for the Nation, together with their numbers of employees and payrolls.

The computer tapes include three files, each available separately; a *United States Summary* with detailed national data; file 1B, summaries for States and census geographic divisions; and 2, summaries by county. These files contain both published and unpublished data for all SIC's at all geographic levels: national, State, and county.

CENSUS OF GOVERNMENTS

The census of governments collects financial and employment data on over 80,000 units of government, including Federal, State, county, municipal, and town or township governments, as well as such particular units as school districts (dependent and independent) and special districts (the latter including such organizations as drainage districts). Data from the 1982 Census of Governments are published in four volumes: Government Organization, \(\Omega\) \(\omega\) \(\omega\) *, GC82-1; Taxable Property Values and Assessment-Sales Price Ratios, \(\omega\) \(\omega\) \(\omega\) *, GC82-2; Government Employment, \(\Omega\) \(\omega\) \(\omega\) * \(\omega\) +, GC82-3 (in three parts); and Government Finances, \(\omega\) \(\omega\) \(\omega\) * \(\omega\) +, GC82-4 (in five parts). Volume 4, part 2, Finances of Special Districts, includes financial and other data on drainage districts.

GOVERNMENTS SURVEYS

The Bureau of the Census publishes several periodic reports on various government activities and operations. Two of these reports may be of particular interest to agriculture data users.

- Federal Expenditures by State for Fiscal Year [year],
 * * + is an annual report showing, by State and territory, total Federal grants to State and local governments (including grants for agricultural stabilization).
- Federal Assistance Award Data System, +, is a quarterly
 report showing Federal grants and payments to State and
 local governments, as well as direct and guaranteed loans to
 individuals or small businesses, and direct payments for
 general or specific purposes (such as agricultural price supports) and other financial assistance.

FOREIGN TRADE STATISTICS

Agricultural products make up a significant portion of United States foreign trade. The Bureau of the Census compiles a broad range of data on imports and exports and publishes a variety of summary and detailed reports. Export data are generally shown by commodity class, net quantity, destination (country and world area), U.S. customs district of export, method of transportation, and month of export. Import data shown include commodity by net quantity, dutiable status and rate, country and world area of origin, U.S. customs district of entry, method of transportation, and month of import. For further information see the *Guide to Foreign Trade Statistics—1983*, \square *.

- U.S. Imports—Consumption and General, SIC-Based Products, by World Areas, ☐ * ## + (series FT210) covers quantity and value.

The data in the FT210 and FT610 reports are summarized by SIC-based export and import product codes, so they may be related fairly directly with economic census tabulations.

THE CENSUSES OF POPULATION AND HOUSING

Censuses of population and housing are carried out every 10 years in years ending in "O" and provide detailed demographic and socioeconomic data about this country's people and their living quarters. The 1980 Census of Population and Housing is the latest of these enumerations and provides statistics on the United States, census geographic regions and divisions, the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the remainder of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. Within States, data are published for SCSA's, SMSA's, counties, cities, and various other political and statistical units down to the size of a city block (in selected areas).

While the population and housing censuses are not directly concerned with collecting data specifically related to agriculture, statistics are obtained and published on population and housing in rural as well as urbanized areas, farm and nonfarm population and housing, income, age, and other characteristics of the population, all of which are valuable in an examination of agriculture in the United States.

The report series listed below all contain data that are, directly or indirectly, most useful in evaluating the agriculture economy. Detail varies by series according to subject and geographic coverage. This listing includes only those report series most obviously useful to agriculture data users. For more information on the 1980 census publication program, see the Bureau of the Census Catalog \square *.

- Number of Inhabitants,
 \$\sum_*\$, series PC80-1-A, shows population counts for States, counties, county subdivisions, places, SCSA's, SMSA's, and urbanized areas. Some counts are by urban/rural residence.
- General Population Characteristics,
 \$\sum_*\$, series PC80-1-B, shows complete-count data (i.e., number of persons in each household, age, sex, race, etc.) for various geographic levels from States down to places with populations of 1,000 or more.

250,000 or more inhabitants, provide data on those subjects collected on a sample basis (such as occupation, income, and commuting), some of which are cross-tabulated by age, race, and other characteristics.

- General Housing Characteristics,
 \(\ldots \) *, series HC80-1-A, contains data for the complete-count housing items—access, number or rooms, kitchen and plumbing facilities, tenure (rented or owned), etc.—tabulated from the State level down to places of 1,000 inhabitants, and includes some crosstabulations by the inhabitants' race or Spanish origin. Some tables display data by urban/rural residence.
- Detailed Housing Characteristics,
 \(\ldots \) *, series HC80-1-B, covers the sample housing items—heating equipment, farm residence, source of water, sewage disposal, etc.—tabulated down to the level of places with 2,500 inhabitants.
- Summary Tape Files (STF's), +. Virtually all of the
 population and housing census data also appear on computer
 tapes in greater detail and for smaller geographic areas than
 in the printed reports. STF's are issued by State, and some
 data can be obtained on microfiche by county.

The 1980 Census of Population and Housing: Users' Guide, \(\sum *\), PHC80-R1, contains a text and several supplements, including a glossary and table-finding guides.

POPULATION AND HOUSING SURVEYS

The Bureau carries on a variety of survey and populationestimation programs, many of which are sponsored by other Federal agencies, such as the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Department of the Treasury, and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The following report series present statistical data drawn from the Bureau's Current Population Surveys.

- Farm Population, \$\limeta \text{*} \forall \text{*} +, series P-27, is a cooperative project of the Bureau of the Census and the U.S Department of Agriculture. Annual reports have been issued since 1947 on the number of persons living on farms, their age and race, and selected characteristics of their employment. Data are shown for the United States.
- Special Studies, ☐ * ☐ 🔁 +, series P23, consists of several reports issued each year on such subjects as youth, the aging, and female family heads.

- Consumer Income, + + + , series P-60, includes annual reports on money income and poverty status of families and individuals, cross-classified by various characteristics. Other reports cover the characteristics of persons receiving various nonmoney benefits, such as food stamps, medical care, public housing, and so on.

With respect to the periodic housing statistics, the Annual Housing Survey provides statistics on urban and rural housing units. The principal data series drawn from the survey, Annual Housing Survey, ** ** ** ** ** ** ** **, series H-150, shows data from a national sample in six reports (parts) that provide information on size and composition of the Nation's housing inventory. Part E, Urban and Rural Housing Characteristics, may be of special interest to agriculture census data users. (Beginning with the reports for 1984, this series' title is changed to "American Housing Survey.")

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
