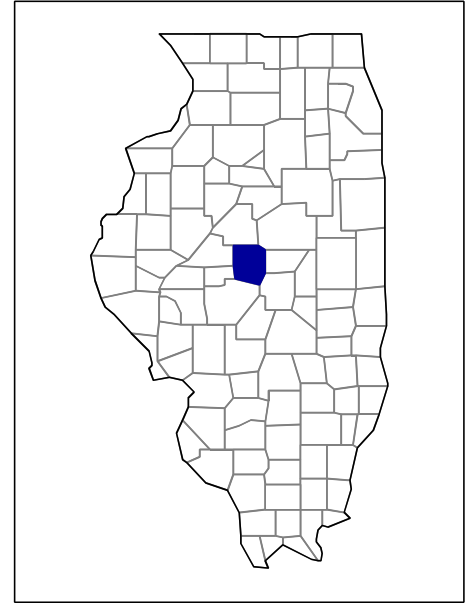




# 2002 Census of Agriculture County Profile

### Market Value of Production, average per farm

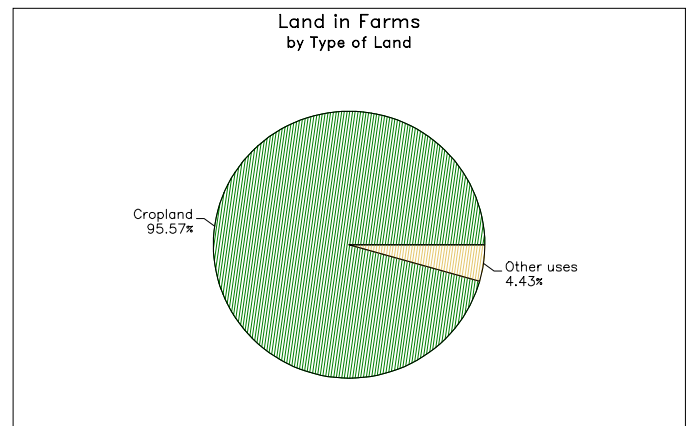
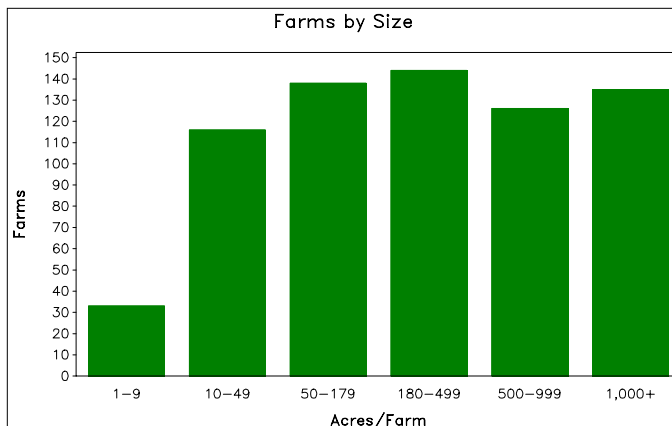
\$159,285 in 2002, \$173,842 in 1997, down 8 percent.
