\$11,310,000 in 2002, \$10,252,000 in 1997, up 10 percent.

Crop sales accounted for \$3,810,000 of the total value in 2002.

Livestock sales accounted for \$7,500,000 of the total value in 2002.

#### Market Value of Production, average per farm

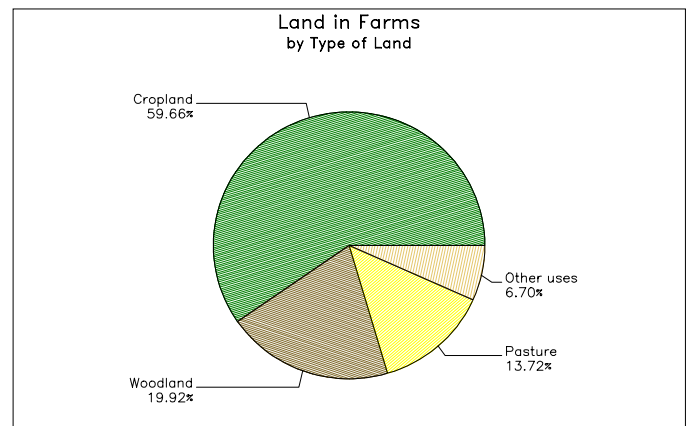
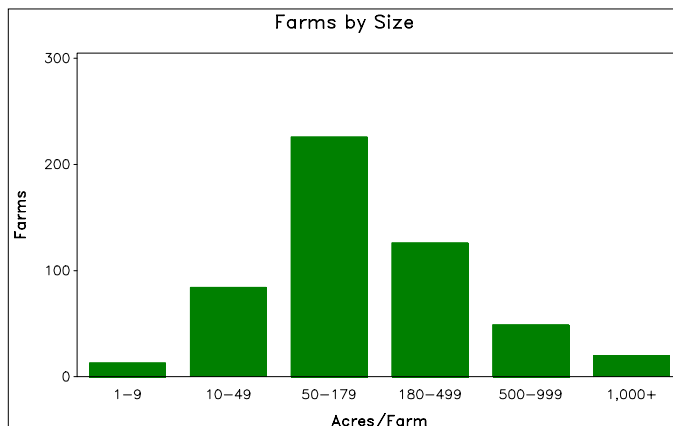
\$21,834 in 2002, \$21,906 in 1997, down slightly.
