

#### **Market Value of Production**

\$72,505,000 in 2002, \$75,211,000 in 1997, down 4 percent. Crop sales accounted for \$34,284,000 of the total value in 2002. Livestock sales accounted for \$38,222,000 of the total value in 2002.

#### Market Value of Production, average per farm




#### **Government Payments**
