


# **2002 Census of Agriculture County Profile**

1,086 farms in 2002, 1,061 farms in 1997, up 2 percent.

158,653 acres in 2002, 163,560 acres in 1997, down 3 percent.

146 acres in 2002, 154 acres in 1997, down 5 percent.

#### **Market Value of Production**

\$46,354,000 in 2002, \$48,581,000 in 1997, down 5 percent. Crop sales accounted for \$19,739,000 of the total value in 2002. Livestock sales accounted for \$26,615,000 of the total value in 2002.

## Market Value of Production, average per farm


\$42,683 in 2002, \$45,787 in 1997, down 7 percent.


#### **Government Payments**
