### Market Value of Production, average per farm

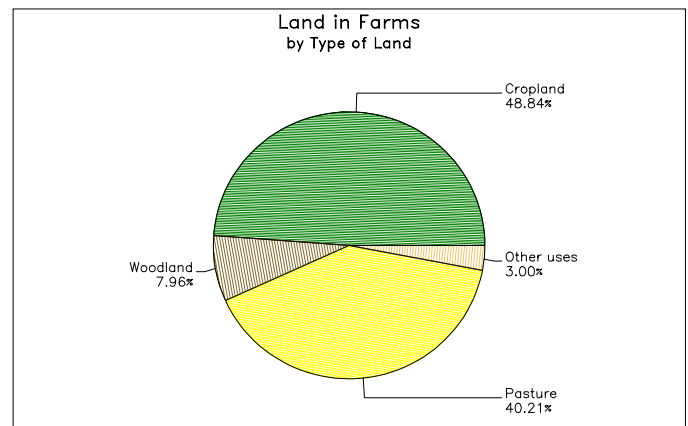
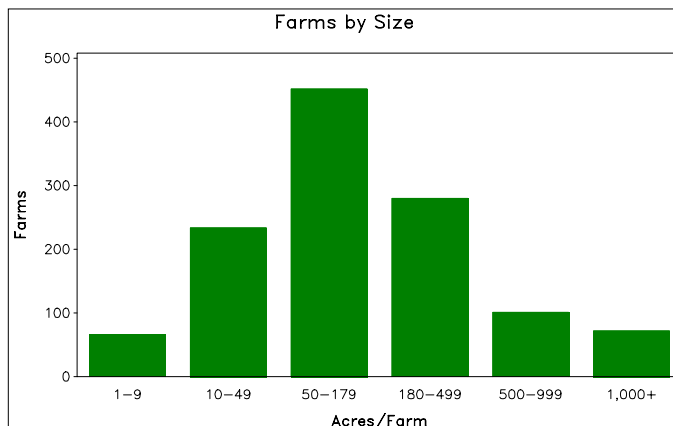
\$34,408 in 2002, \$35,962 in 1997, down 4 percent.
