


# **2002 Census of Agriculture County Profile**

1,773 acres in 2002, 1,661 acres in 1997, up 7 percent.

#### **Market Value of Production**

\$23,173,000 in 2002, \$18,838,000 in 1997, up 23 percent. Crop sales accounted for \$2,796,000 of the total value in 2002. Livestock sales accounted for \$20,377,000 of the total value in 2002.

## Market Value of Production, average per farm


\$73,564 in 2002, \$57,963 in 1997, up 27 percent.


#### **Government Payments**
