The 2012 Census of Agriculture lets us know who is involved in U.S. agriculture – from family farmers to hired labor, and from new, beginning farmers to next-generation farmers. Census data help inform smart policymaking to benefit farmers and ranchers, their communities, businesses and industries.



#### **58** YEARS

The average age of a principal farm operator. **The average age** is generally highest in the south, and lowest in the upper plains.

### 3.2 MILLION

The number of all farm operators in the U.S. in 2012.

That's more farmers than the entire population of Iowa.



## **22** PERCENT

The percent of all farmers in the U.S. who were beginning farmers in 2012.



That means 1 out of every 5 farmers operated a farm for less than 10 years.

### **87** PERCENT

The percent of farms that are operated by families or individuals in the U.S.

Of the total number of operators, 2.4 million live on their farms.

Hired farm workers account for less than 1% of all U.S. wage and salary workers but are vital to agriculture production.

The number of Millennial Generation farmers age 34 or younger in the U.S. in 2012.
